Cranberry Sage Jelly

Bring to a boil 1 ¾ cups of cranberry juice, tops of 9 stalks of fresh sage, slightly crushed or about a Tbl. of dried sage, crushed. Cover, let stand 20 minutes, off heat. Strain. Add 2 cups of sugar, ¼ cup of lime juice, ½ tsp. butter. Heat, stirring, until boiling. Add ½ package (1 foil envelope) of Certo; boil hard 1 minute. Pack in sterilized jars and seal. Makes about 3 cups.

This is a spin on cranberry sauce. It's good with poultry but can also be used on rolls and biscuits. If you have sage in your garden, it can still be harvested to use.

Fertilizing Trees and Shrubs

Now is a good time to fertilize all your trees and shrubs. By putting a granular fertilizer on now, it has time to work its way down into the soil over winter. That way it is available for the plants in the spring when they need it. We recommend Holly-tone and Plant-tone. They are good organic foods that improve the soil. If you have trees or shrubs in a lawn area, use tree spikes. They won't damage the grass. If you have never fertilized your trees and shrubs, give a try. You will be amazed at how good they look.

Deer Repellants

It's time to start applying deer repellants to your trees and shrubs. Many people find that if they apply some for a couple months, it trains the deer to go elsewhere to feed. We carry Liquid Fence, Repels-all and Deer Scram. We use Liquid Fence but other people say that the other ones have worked for them. We also have Liquid Fence for Rabbits which is very effective Fox Urine Granules work for both rabbits and groundhogs.

Use the winter months to get a handle on the coming spring. Plan new gardens or other things like patios, decks or gazebos. Leaf through the catalogs and magazines to get new ideas. Start a gardening notebook with all of the things that you didn't get done this fall and your great new ideas for spring. Look for new plants you'd like to try. Make a list of vegetables you want to grow. Get in seed orders. Clean up your gardening tools. Sharpen them or get them sharpened. Sand rust off of tools and give them a good coat of oil.

Every gardener knows under the cloak of winter lies a miracle – a seed waiting to sprout, a bulb opening to light, a bud straining to unfurl. And the anticipation nurtures our dream. Barbara Winkler

Decorating with Fresh Greens

Using fresh greens to decorate is really easy. Because they are all in shades of green, you don't have to be as precise when you arrange them. Most anyone can do it.

You probably have some things in your yard that you can start with. Anything evergreen will do. Yew, arborvitae, juniper, false cypress, spruce or pine etc. can be used. Things like boxwood, rhododendron, azalea, Mt. laurel and holly make good accents. Then you can buy a few bundles of unusual greens like incense cedar and berried juniper. After you place all the greens, you can add dried materials, cones, ribbons and berries. Greens are nice because especially outdoors, they don't need to be in water. They can just be put in any container.

Swags are easy to make. You can make simple swags in quantity to put on fence posts or windows. Tie a couple pieces of greens together and add a bow. Wreaths and garland are harder to make. These are items that you will probably want to buy. Use them in key areas where they give you a lot of bang for your buck. Many people only buy a wreath for on their door or over their mantle. They put garland around their door or on the porch railing. Some buy only bunches of the unusual greens to add some interest to the greens they already have.

It's nice to have at least one fresh item in your house especially if you only decorate with artificial. It gives a nice fragrance to the house.

Wilt Pruf

You can spray Wilt Pruf on greens that you are using in the house. It seals the moisture in so that they last longer. It can be used on trees, wreaths, garland and loose greens. Spray it on outside and let it dry.

Winter Hours

Caring for your Houseplants in the Winter

Houseplants need much different care in the house in the winter. The plant that you watered every couple days outside during the summer may not need watered once a month in the house. Most houseplants go dormant during the winter months just like our trees and shrubs outside. Some plants like African Violets continue to grow and bloom over the winter.

Don't over water your plants during the winter. Most house plants die due to over watering. Stick your finger in the soil. If the top inch or so is dry, give it a drink. Don't give it a soaking. Be careful to not leave water in the saucer.

Houseplants also don't need fertilized in the winter unless they are actively growing. Putting food on a plant that is not using it and you are not watering regularly can burn the roots. You can start feeding your houseplants again in March or April.

Low humidity is another problem in the house in winter. Misting your plants every couple days can help with this problem. Or fill the saucer with stones and water. Don't let the water come up to the bottom of the pot. The water will evaporate and raise the humidity around the plant.

Don't repot houseplants in the winter. The new soil sitting wet around the roots can cause roots to rot. The only exception to this is if you have a plant that is so root bound that the water just runs through. Only move it up 1 pot size and be careful of your watering.

Watch for insects. If you didn't spray your plants 3 times one week apart before you brought them in, you will get insects. I would advise spraying them now before the problem gets out of hand. An organic spray like insecticidal soap or pyrethrins will do fine. Spray all surfaces including the stems. Make sure to get down into the tips of the stems. Little critters like to hide there. Keep a watch all winter and treat for insects as necessary. If you have scale, use horticultural oil to treat for it.

Keep plants out of drafts – both warm and cold. Be careful near windows. The areas near windows can be 20 degrees colder than the room temperature.

In March, clean up your plants. Wash off the leaves and trim out any dead. You can repot your plants now or let it go until you take them back outside. Use a good quality soil-less mix when you repot.

Forcing Branches

When we get into the dreary months of January and February, think about forcing branches of flowering shrubs. Shrubs like forsythia, mockorange, witch hazel, quince, serviceberry, lilac, pussy willow and PJM rhododendron can be forced. Some trees that can be forced are redbuds, magnolia, cherry, crabapple and Bradford pear. Cut the branches and put them in warm water. Keep them in a cool spot (45-55 degrees) until the buds start to swell. Then bring them in and enjoy. Change the water frequently. As a bonus, some of the branches may root and you'll have new plants for free.

Starting Seeds

I have been in this profession for 40 years and I still get a kick out of starting seeds. It is still amazing to see the little plants pop through the soil. Start saving take out containers, egg cartons and frozen dinner containers. Or use old pots and packs. Make sure to clean them well. They all make good, free seed starting containers. Use a good seed starting mix. Do research on the internet. Do the seeds need a cold treatment? Do they need covered with soil or not? How early should you start them? Make sure you start them early enough that they get big enough by planting time but not to have 6 foot tall tomato plants. Start them someplace warm. Many people start them on the top of the fridge or freezer and then move them to a sunny spot or under plant lights. Make sure to gradually harden them off outside before planting.

- Clean and sharpen tools
- Prune raspberries and blackberries
